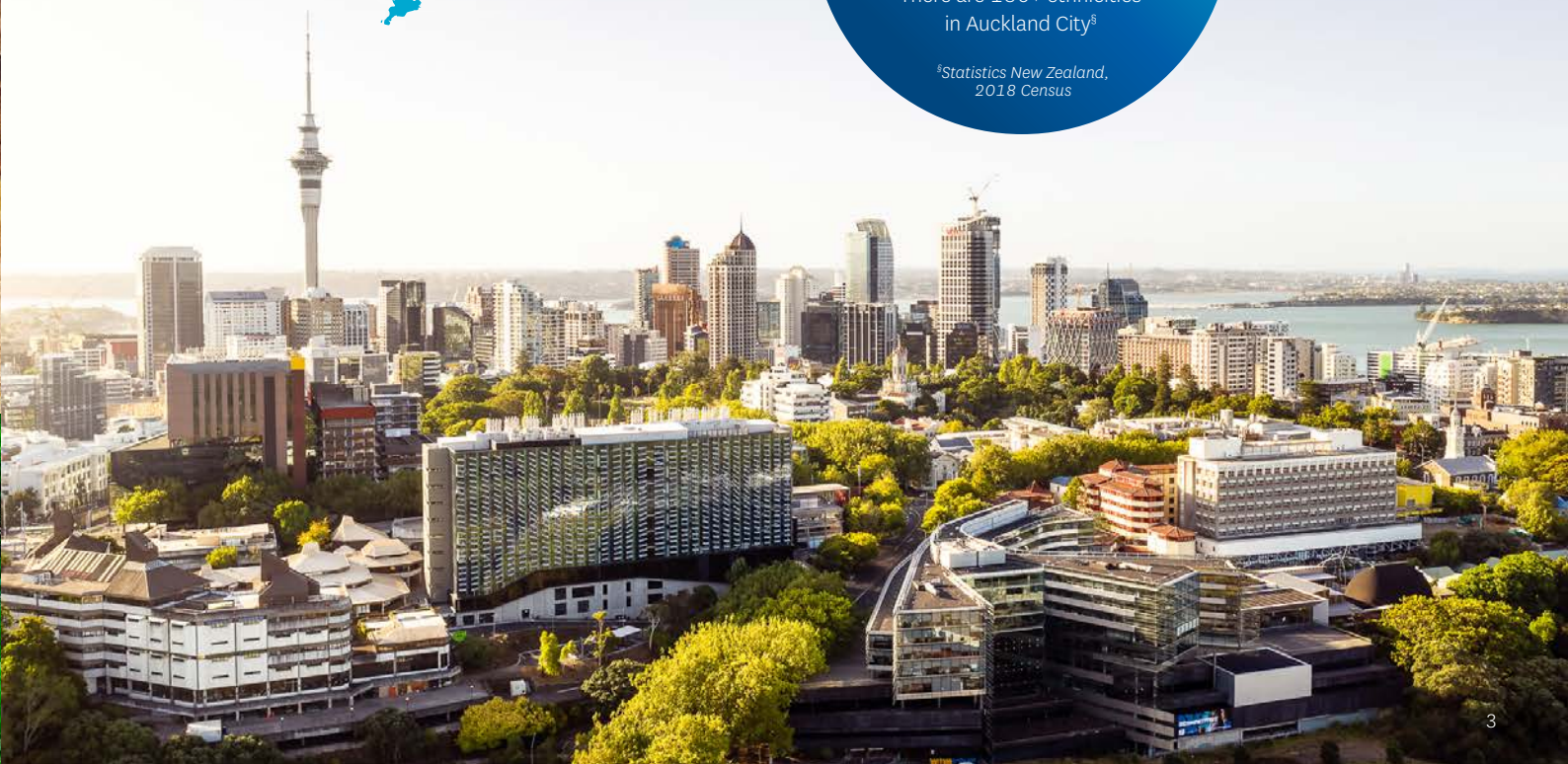

## Entry Requirements

Complete at least one full-time year of university study at the time of application unless you are considered under special admission. You should have a cumulative grade point average of 2.7 on a 4.0 scale (B- average) or its equivalent.

If you are from a country that is not recognised with English as a first language, you must provide evidence of meeting the University's English language requirements. The required score for the Exchange and Study Abroad Programme is:

### IELTS (Academic):

Overall score of 6.0 and no bands below 5.5

### Internet-based TOEFL (iBT):

Overall score of 80 and a writing score of 21

## Courses

With more than 100 subjects available, you can explore both subjects that are unique to New Zealand and those that you need to complete for your degree at home. The list of course options is on page 5. You can take courses across different subjects and levels as long as you meet prerequisites for relevant courses.

The standard full-time load at the University of Auckland is four courses (60 points) per semester. Most courses weigh 15 points, which represents 150 hours of study or 10 hours of study per week for 15 weeks.

Courses at the University of Auckland are generally made up of a lecture plus a tutorial or lab component. There will be one lecture stream throughout the week covering the main content of the course. You also choose one tutorial or lab session which fits within your timetables.

### 1. Apply to your home university

To be eligible for exchange, you must be studying at one of our [Exchange Partners](#). First, you must apply for exchange at your home university.

### 2. Get nominated to the University of Auckland

Your home university nominates you to the University of Auckland if you meet their requirements. At that time, you receive the invitation to apply from the Study Abroad Team.

# Guaranteed accommodation

We commit to offering on-campus accommodation to every study abroad or exchange student who applies to the University by the deadline.

The sooner you apply, the sooner your accommodation will be reserved for you. Accommodation is only guaranteed for students who submit applications before the application deadlines.\*

We encourage you to apply for accommodation as soon as applications open, even if you have not yet completed your application to study at the University of Auckland. This will help to ensure you have a place at a University residence hall.

At the time you accept your residential agreement, you are required to pay \$950 to secure your place (\$650 accommodation deposit and \$300 administration fee). The \$650 deposit forms part of your overall accommodation fee.

Confidential references and visa document are not required for Study Abroad and Exchange students to apply for accommodation.

## Accommodation application dates

### Semester One (February to June 2025):

Open on 1 August 2024  
Close 15 October 2024

### Semester Two 2025 (July to November 2025):

Open on 1 April 2025  
Close on 1 May 2025

The University's Accommodation Solutions team will attempt to place a student in on-campus accommodation even after deadlines have passed.

If your home university or provider arranges university housing for you, you do not have to apply individually. Please check with them first. A family room or couple room is excluded from guaranteed housing due to our capacity.

Accommodation is a semester contract of 21 weeks. You can move in and out within the contract dates. The tentative dates of contract in 2025 are:

\*Study Abroad students pay a single flat fee, which covers tuition fees for up to 60 points (usually four courses) and includes the student services fee. Additional fees may be charged for enrolments over 60 points. Exchange students pay tuition fees to the home university.

The fees and living costs here are estimated based on 2024 fees and expenses and can vary depending on your lifestyle. Costs are listed in New Zealand dollars based on a semester of 21 weeks.

## Scholarships

The University of Auckland is giving more students the opportunity to study in New Zealand and offers partner scholarships for fee-paying study abroad students. Check with your home study abroad office to see if you are eligible.

## Insurance

All enrolled international students must have approved health and travel insurance (regardless of the visa type) for the duration of the visa or until you depart New Zealand, whichever comes first.

The University of Auckland will automatically charge Studentsafe insurance fee to your account after enrolment. You must pay the fee unless the University of Auckland approves the use of an alternative insurance policy.

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If you have an [approved alternative insurance policy](#), you can apply for an insurance waiver by the second Friday of the semester. If your policy is included in the University's [list of not approved insurance policies](#), you have to pay the University insurance. If you have an insurance policy that is not on either approved or not approved lists of policies, then you can send your insurance policy documents for an assessment at least four weeks prior to the semester start date.

## Visa

Exchange and Study Abroad students must enter New Zealand with a valid visa to study for the entire period of study. Check details of visa on the Immigration New Zealand website ([www.immigration.govt.nz](http://www.immigration.govt.nz)). Visa requirements may vary depending on country of origin and personal situation. You must apply online for the right type of visa as soon as you receive an Offer of Place from the University of Auckland.

Under current Immigration New Zealand regulations, only one-year Exchange students can have work rights.

## Checklists before travel

- Upload [evidence of your visa online](#). You must provide evidence of your visa by the first day of semester.
- Upload your [Campus Card photo](#)
- Pay tuition, insurance and accommodation fees. You don't have to pay if you have already paid fees to your home university or provider.
- Advise the residence hall of your check-in date and time
- Submit the [Airport Pick Up form](#) at least 5 days before your departure. If your provider organises the pickup, please do not submit the form.
- Sign up for the International Orientation Welcome. The details of orientation are provided via the pre-departure newsletter.
